Lesson #8 Jesus the Servant Leader

<u>Appetizer:</u> For Jesus, leadership meant service. In his words, "the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45). Knowing he was a king, he acted as a servant. This was his paradox of greatness.

Do you consider yourself a leader? Why or why not? Do others consider you a leader? What kind of leader do you want to be?

<u>Discussion</u>: Think of a leader who motivated you to perform beyond your expectations. What characterized that person?

Main Course: Read Mark 10:32-45.

- 1. What ideas do the disciples have about leadership? What ideas does Jesus have about leadership?
- 2. As Jesus leads the way to Jerusalem, what impression do you get of him as a leader (vv. 32-34)?
- 3. How does the request of James and John seem inappropriate in light of verses 32-34?
- 4. What does it mean to sit at Jesus' right and left hand (v. 37)?
- 5. How does Jesus challenge and clarify their request (vv. 38-40)?
- 6. Why do you think the other disciples were so indignant (v. 41)?
- 7. What opportunities do we have at home, work or even here at our church building for greatness?
- 8. It's been said that "leadership seeks great things, and acts in small things." How does Jesus show this?
- 9. What attracts you to a leader like Jesus?

<u>Dessert:</u> Read Mark 10:46-54. Does it just happen that the story of the blind beggar follows next---- or are the two stories related? Explain.
